## Discovery Elementary validated as a Minnesota School of Excellence



Discovery Elementary School is one of three elementary schools in the state recently validated as a Minnesota School of Excellence (SOE) by the Minnesota Elementary School Principals' Association (MESPA). This prestigious honor was awarded to Discovery in September for its commitment to modern teaching and learning.

"Through the Minnesota School of Excellence (SOE) program, grounded in national research on high-performing schools, MESPA has created the premier opportunity in the state for validating excellence and a commitment to continual growth in a school community," said Jon Millerhagen, MESPA executive director. "This school improvement program examines the entire school community through six national standards, ensuring there is a holistic approach to creating a plan for future achievement and celebrating the unique accomplishments of each School of Excellence."

Tami Staloch-Schultz, chair of the SOE Committee, said, "It takes commitment and teamwork to honestly and thoroughly assess areas of strength and at the same time identify a plan for continual growth. The SOE process asks the entire school community parents, students, staff, administration and more — to reflect on and celebrate the collaborative work being done in school communities. Schools that receive validation have had important data-driven conversations about what a high-quality, modern learning experience should be for all students and have plans to make that learning experience a reality for many years to come."

Dr. Mathew Nelson is principal of the 260-student Discover Elementary. "It goes without saying that we don't do what we do for any kind of recognition, but this award to our educational community is appreciated," Nelson said. "In our profession, we are humbly committed to improvement in student progress and our communication with families as we work together to encourage more growth. This process has helped us continue in our ongoing improvement efforts while also allowing us to reflect on and realize that there are so many great things happening at Discovery Elementary that deserve recognition."

As part of the SOE process, Discovery highlighted their staff and faculty as their greatest strength. "We have amazing, committed teachers and



staff," said Nelson. "I believe that the number one predictor of student success and success of a school is the effectiveness of the people, and our people are effective, phenomenal educators that are committed to ongoing growth."

Although the COVID-19 pandemic made the 2020-21 school year particularly challenging, Nelson and the SOE committee at Discovery pushed themselves to complete the rigorous validation process alongside their dayto-day duties.

"We know that doing the easy thing is not always the right thing to do," Nelson said. "But we believed that the right thing to do was to recognize and honor our school community's collaborative efforts, ongoing commitment to excellence and doing what is best for the students, families and the Buffalo-Hanover-Montrose communities we serve."

According to Nelson, the SOE experience helped to emphasize a foundation of positive relationships at Discovery. "We often remind ourselves and each other of our belief that the students may forget what we taught them, but they will never forget how we made them feel while they are here. We want students to feel cared for, valued, loved, respected and important because they are!"

Since the inception of MESPA's SOE program in 1986, 218 schools have earned the Minnesota School of Excellence validation. The validation remains effective for seven years, at which point schools may choose to reapply for validation.

## Just like our students, we learn more every day

As I write this column, it is hard to believe that we are already halfway through the first term of the 2021-2022 school year. It is so heartwarming to be among our amazing BHM school community again.



We had an amazing start to the school year in early September as we welcomed our incredible students back into our buildings. We do this so that we are able to implement protocols and procedures that are most appropriate for our BHM school community. Currently, we strongly recommend, but do not require, face coverings in our school. We continue to implement additional safety protocols and mitigation measures, including cleaning and sanitizing, monitoring air quality and practicing safe distancing when able. We make district decisions with the best information available to us and consider what is in the best interest of our entire BHM family. We also know that no decision will make everyone happy. Much like when we develop a school calendar or allocate budget resources, we do what is best for the 5300+ students and 750 staff in our care. That being said, we are committed to continuously reassessing our COVID-19 protocols and decisions and, should situations change or if health officials provide us with new guidelines, we will adjust accordingly.

This is a challenging time for all of us. We will continue our efforts to keep students in school where they are able to engage and learn together. We are proud to partner with our families, staff and communities on this journey of making BHM schools the place for students to **dream**, **believe** and **achieve**.

# Inside Buffalo High School 🦓

### BHM Prepares Students for Their Next Steps Through Career and College Readiness Programs



When it comes to their student's future success, Buffalo High School places the utmost importance on Career and College readiness. Through the College in the Schools (CIS) and Advanced Placement (AP) courses offered at Buffalo High School, our goal is to allow our students to earn college credit all while having a fulfilling and rewarding high school experience. We help forge a path for success for all students through a unique set of courses that align with the Minnesota Transfer Curriculum (MnTC). Partnerships with Southwest Minnesota State University, St. Cloud State University, University of Minnesota, North Hennepin Community College and Hennepin Technical College allow BHS students to experience a wide variety of college and career learning opportunities.

The MnTC is a planning resource for students that promotes and encourages a college-going climate, all while reducing their college debt. BHS teachers are trained and credentialed to teach these college courses, offering our students a supportive environment while they experience the rigor of college.

For Kurt Konsela, who teaches Industrial Tech within the CIS program at BHS, he appreciates hearing from former students who went through the program, specifically about the experiences they have had as they transition to college. "I have had several students either in-person (back from college on winter or spring break) or through email, stating that what they're doing in their college courses is the same material/information that they did while here at BHS," said Konsela. "They appreciate what I taught them is being used and is useful in their college classes."

For Megan Breyer, middle school Family and Consumer Science (FACS) teacher as well as CIS Child and Human Development at BHS, she enjoys the higher level conversations that come with teaching a CIS class. "I love that the class teaches students skills they will need for working with kids either in their current or future jobs, as well as their personal lives in the future." As part of the course students must care for a "RealCare" baby for the weekend, babies that have sophisticated computers that replicate actual newborn baby schedules and require care at the most inconvenient times. After the weekend, students write a reflection paper about the experience. "I love reading how students appreciate how their parents have sacrificed for them over the years," she said.

Since its origin in 2014, the MnTC program at BHS has helped students earn more than 20,000 college credits, all before they have even received their

high school diplomas. Additionally, these credits have resulted in a financial savings of over \$6.5 million for families!

BHS 2020 graduate Katie Burandt reflected on the tremendous help these classes offered her as she prepared for the college workload and expectations. "A lot of my teachers at BHS told us right away how they were going to treat us differently, like college kids, and how their class will be structured differently," said Burandt. "There was not going to be any test retakes, lots of note taking, more studying, research, presentations, papers, etc."

In addition to the opportunity to earn college credits through their high school classes, students also get to take advantage of the contacts and experience afforded through the relationships with the local partners. In the CIS Landscaping class, there is an opportuntiy for a hands-on career day during the Green Expo every January. "It's a great opportunity to meet professionals in the green industry," said Gary Wirkus, CIS Landscaping and Animal Science Teacher. Additionally, students are able to take advantage of some of the amazing facilities of the CIS partners, such as being able to attend the handson animal science labs offered by the University of Minnesota teaching staff and professionals in the industry. For Wirkus, the opportunities are even more personal. Wikus's daughter, Zara, BHS 2018 graduate, went on to earn a degree and start her career in landscape design. "This class opens a lot of doors to the green industry," Wirkus said.

BHS offers 40 Career and College Readiness courses through the CIS programs, nine through technical schools, and additional AP classes in calculus, music theory and computer science. Like the CIS classes, AP classes help students gain the skills and study habits they need to be successful in college, and students can earn college credit, which is nationally recognized and accepted by taking a standardized AP test in the subject area.
