Erlandson now leading Community Education

On Tuesday, Oct. 1, Eric Erlandson stepped in as the new Director of Community Education for Buffalo-Hanover-Montrose Schools.

He replaces Kim Carlson, who served BHM Schools for 18 years.

Before accepting his new role Erlandson was the Director of Community Education for Delano Public Schools, and he has a strong organizational leadership background in both education and business.

Erlandson began his career as a Community Education program supervisor in Monticello (1997-1998) and program coordinator in Waconia (1998-2001) before taking his first job as a Director of Community Education with Albany Public Schools in 2001. He then joined Annandale Public Schools as the Director of Community Education in 2004, and also served as the district's business manager.

Although he has a passion

for Community Education, Erlandson stepped away from the field in 2007 to help his father with Action Fastenings, a small family owned business focused on specialty tools and fasteners. During a 13-year period as president of the company, Erlandson oversaw exponential growth from a local business to one that served the entire United States and Canada.

In 2021 he sold the com-

pany in order to return to Community Education, and took the director's role in Delano.

While evaluating candidates, the hiring committee noted that Erlandson values relationships and partnerships within the schools and community, that he takes multiple perspectives into account when solving problems, and that his diverse leadership background and ongoing pursuit of educational opportunities demonstrate a valuable growth mindset. Erlandson earned his undergraduate degree from St. Cloud State University in 1998, and along with other academic advancements recently earned a doctorate of education in executive leadership from St. Mary's University.

"Everywhere he has gone he has done an outstanding job. We're fortunate to have him on our team, and we're really excited to have him join the BHM School District," Thielman said.

Erlandson said the enthusiasm is mutual.

"I was attracted to the district's long-held reputation for commitment to kids and families," he said. "The strong community identity and the opportunity to contribute to it was a draw. I am excited to help grow and improve our programs while contributing to the overall success of BHM Schools. I am excited to take my past experiences and apply them as a Bison!"

Although more than 1.3 million students compete for National Merit scholarships each year, few advance beyond the first step of taking the Preliminary SAT/ National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test due to the highly selective nature of the competition.

In September, however, two Buffalo High School seniors learned that they ranked among the top 1% of students in the national pool, qualifying them to become semifinalists for a National Merit scholarship.

They are no strangers to academic success, but Jayde Hallman and Julien Kariniemi said the news was still surprising.

"It's pretty hard to conceptualize that fact," said Hallman, who was one of Buffalo High School's ExCEL

Award winners last winter for leadership across a range of disciplines, from sports and fine arts to community volunteering. "It's kind of like, 'Oh, it's just us two. Cool.'"

While Hallman and Kariniemi are the only semifinalists, Buffalo High School also had three students earn Commended Student status by finishing in the top 2.6% of students who took the PSAT nationally. Commended Students do not advance for scholarship consideration, but Dexter Huss, Daniel Jungwirth and Mackenzie Koren have still distinguished themselves among the top students nationally.

BHS Principal Mark Mischke said that having five total students earn semifinalist or commended status might be the most the school has ever had in one year.

"What we dream of happening at the high school is that every kid sees themselves in our building," Mischke said. "Rigor with support is the theme. We've given them rigorous challenges and supported them along the way in the things they want to explore. They are great examples to our community."






Election 2024 Candidate Profiles



Candidates

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What do you believe is the most important issue facing education today?

• Bjorklund: I think some of the most important issues facing the school district are educational inequity and fiscal responsibility. Students deserve equitable access to technology, educational resources, and support from our district. They shouldn't be granted nor denied access to opportunities solely based on the school they attend. I will work with district staff and teachers to create equitable access to educational resources, ensuring all students receive the same opportunities within BHM Schools. I will use my professional experience as a financial advisor to ensure the district is fiscally responsible with the taxpayers' money.

• Burns: Education should always provide an encouraging, safe environment for students to learn. It is important to engage the students, parents, and school staff to form a successful learning environment for all students.

• **Greig:** The most important issue today is our drop in proficiency across the board. If our community cannot read and understand they cannot flourish.

• Holmstrom Jr: In the last three years Minnesota has gone from being ranked seventh nationally in education to 19th, and across the country test scores are nearing all-time lows. Schools are struggling to properly engage students. Our board needs to examine how we are reaching our students and work with our educators to determine the necessary tools, resources and best practices needed to monopolize on the time we have with them.

• **Honsey:** I think there is a mistrust of our education system that is perpetuated by the media. Oftentimes we see issues at another school and believe the same is happening at our schools.

• Lawrence: Like every public school district, the top issue facing our district is a critical shortfall in funding. Every year, the gap between the cost of running the district and the amount of state funding we receive gets larger. We are forced to ask the residents of our district to make up this difference in order to maintain the staffing levels, programs and overall excellent education that our students deserve. Minnesota did make a large investment to public education in 2023, but the investment nowhere near erased the cumulative effect of over 20 years of shortfalls. Unfortunately, there is no easy solution. Communicating with lawmakers and advocating for public education is vital.

• **Zbaracki:** I believe the most important issue facing education today is the declining proficiency in math, reading and science. This can be fixed by hiring more teachers and decreasing the administrative bureaucracy so students have more individual attention in subjects they're behind in.

Why do you believe BHM Schools is the place to dream, believe and achieve?

• **Bjorklund:** I believe our schools have the best staff around who genuinely care about the education and well-being of every student.

• Burns: My daughter and granddaughter had wonderful experiences in the BHM Schools. I believe that their teachers and school staff made a real difference in their lives and have set a strong foundation for their lives. I have been impressed with both the quality and the compassion of the BHM School teachers and staff, and if elected, look forward to working with them.

• **Greig:** I think they have the child's well being at the heart of their decisions.

• Holmstrom Jr: I graduated from BHM Schools, and chose to raise my family here in large part because of the values and opportunities offered to me in this community. I have always been proud to have come from our schools and I intend to work diligently to ensure that my children and yours have the same experience.

• Honsey: It comes down to our people. We have great teachers and excellent leaders at each of our schools that care about each individual student. I have seen this day in and day out with my time at BCMS in the AVID program.

• Lawrence: BHM Schools recognize that every student has unique dreams. Our students have a huge variety of classes, programs, and activities to choose from, encompassing a myriad of different interests. We need to maintain these great options so every student can believe in themselves and their abilities, achieve excellence in something they feel passionate about, and learn important skills to help them reach their future goals.

• **Zbaracki:** Kids have their futures ahead of them. A strong, solid educational foundation is paramount to achieving their dreams. With great teachers and learning opportunities in the district, kids can believe their dreams will come true!

Bond updates: enhancing our schools

Thanks to the overwhelming support for the bond referendum, we are moving forward with several important projects that will improve our facilities, enhance student safety, and create better learning environments.

Playgrounds: This summer the playgrounds at Tatanka Elementary STEM School, Montrose Elementary School of Innovation and Hanover Elementary School were upgraded to unitary surfaces, which will improve accessibility and provide a safer, smoother surface for all children to enjoy.

Bids will begin for the following projects and construction is scheduled to begin in the spring of 2025.

Buffalo Community Middle School (BCMS) – The bid package for BCMS includes several key improvements:

• An addition at the main entrance to create a secure entrance, enhancing safety.

• Conversion of the heating system from steam condensate to low-pressure hot water, using the existing steam boilers.

• A remodel of the stu-

dent services area, making it more efficient and accessible for students.

• Installation of a chilled-water cooling system to ensure a more energy efficient and comfortable learning environment.

• Three alternate bids will also be received for the removal of demountable partitions (temporary walls) and classroom remodels.

Buffalo High School (**BHS**) – The bid package for BHS includes the following:

• An addition at the main entrance to create a secure entrance, enhancing safety.

• A remodel of the Performing Arts Center to enhance the experience for both performers and audiences. This includes new lighting, sound, seating and curtains.

• Remodeling of the media center to provide





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students with more collaborative accessible spaces.

• Updates to resource areas on the second floor to better support student learning.

• Installation of a chilled-water cooling system, similar to the middle school, for improved climate control and energy efficiency.

Discovery Elementary School (DES) – The DES bid package will be opened concurrently with the high school bid. Updates include: • Upgrades to the auditorium, including new curtains and lighting, enhancing the space for school events and performances.

• A vestibule addition at Door 6 to improve security and accessibility.

• A remodel of the interior corridor at Door 6 to create a better traffic flow.

• Egress changes to the lower-level storage areas to comply with safety standards.

These projects will bring significant improvements to our facilities, ensuring that our schools remain safe, efficient and conducive to high-quality education. I will continue to keep you updated on the progress of these projects throughout the year. The updates and upgrades will make a lasting impact on our schools for years to come, and we are excited to see them take shape.

Thank you for your continued support, and I look forward to a fantastic school year!
