Innovation Station

Hello NES families!

We have been exploring innovation in writing! The kindergartners are working on a digital class ABC book. They cannot wait to share when it's done! First graders are also working on a digital class book working on rhyming. It is based off of the Dr. Suess book *There's a Wocket in my Pocket*. He is the king of rhyming himself, so we hope to do him justice! In second grade, we are working on a digital class book showing off second grade talent. It is a *How to…* book and we cannot wait to share all of the tutorials with you when we are done. Third graders are going to be starting their animal reports, a third grade research project. They will be able to learn a variety of ways to share their learning using a digital tool and pick the one that will work for them! Fourth graders have been using a story starter website from scholastic (check it out at <u>scholastic.com/</u><u>teachers/story-starters/</u>). Students spin the wheel and find out what silly, outrageous topic they will be writing about. Writing is SO fun!





Finally, fifth graders are working on their argument skills. We've talked about how arguing can be seen in a negative way, but if we use critical thinking and respect, arguing can be a really good skill. Think of how many jobs and situations outside of school those convincing skills would come in handy. With a partner, they have chosen a topic and each will present a side- for or against- and will record their arguments in podcast form. We will vote as classes to see which argument convinced you best! That's all for innovation station- thanks for reading!

We're wrapping up our studies of China in 1st, 4th, and 5th grade. With over 1.3 billion people living in China, we've been looking at the world's most heavily populated country. Warm Greetings from the Music Room! The music room has been hopping with recorder playing! Third, fourth and fifth graders are learning to play recorders and challenging themselves along the way. Social Emotional Focus— Ms. Hageman



A child's social and emotional skills have a big impact on their academic learning. Therefore, our goal at Northwinds is to partner with you to develop your child's academic, social, and emotional learning. For the remainder for the year, this column will focus on how parents/guardians can help their child develop different social and emotional skills. February's social and emotional learning area will be on self awareness. CASEL (ie Collaboration for Academic, Social, and Emotional Learning) defines self awareness as the ability to identify one's thoughts, feelings, and strengths, and then recognize how these things influence one's choices and actions. Self

awareness is a foundational social and emotional skill area. A child will have difficulty being strong in the other social and emotional skill set areas if they are not strong in the skill area of self awareness. Understood, an organization that supports parents with learning and attention issues, explains that when a child has strong self awareness skills, they are able to recognize their strengths and weaknesses; can identify what they need to do to complete tasks; can recognize errors in schoolwork and are able to make edits/changes; can understand and talk about their feelings; recognizes other people's needs and feelings; and can see how their behavior affects others.

There are several ways that you as a parent/guardian are able to facilitate your child's development in self awareness. Listed below are 3 simple things you can do with your child to develop self awareness.

1. Help your child name emotions. When your child is feeling a big emotion, describe their body language and what that body language is showing you. For example "Your hanging your head low, that makes me think you are feeling sad right now". This helps your child identify how they are feeling.

2. When your child experiences a conflict with others, help them see how the other people in the conflict may feel or think. Engage your child in thinking about the situation by asking questions like "How do you think that made the other person feel?" or "I wonder what that other person was thinking when you said you didn't want to play with them at recess". These type of questions will get your child to proactively think about how others are thinking and feeling.

3. Model a growth mindset. Growth mindset means you have the attitude that you can improve your abilities and talents. People with a growth mindset are more likely to continue during challenges and view mistakes as opportunities to learn. When your child is difficulty learning a new skill or ability, remind them mistakes help us grow and we will improve the

more we try.
