Innovation Stations—Mrs. Franzen




Hi NES parents!

I hope your break and holidays were relaxing and full of joy! In December and January our big focus is on coding in innovation station. You may be wondering why coding is important? Coding uses all of the 4 Cs (creativity, critical thinking, communication, and collaboration) and really allows kids to work on projects that have a start and finish, which teaches perseverance. Coding is the way we tell computers or technology what we want them to do. Coding allows us to create computer software, apps, and web-

sites. We practice coding by first learning the basic codes of left, right, forward, and backward. We practice on the tiles on the floor, then build up to apps that put our codes to work, and finally, we learn how to program robots. We will continue learning about coding until the end of January! The students enjoy the challenge that coding provides, which is fun to watch. Did you know that in 2016, there were already 200,000 unfilled programming jobs in the United States?! Coding in elementary school can open up children's eyes about a new career path that they maybe didn't know existed,

but furthermore, it really helps them work on critical thinking and problem solving, which is a key skill in any career, job path, or future schooling. 



Quest Program Assessment

The Quest program in Buffalo-Hanover-Montrose schools services highly gifted students (top two to three percent in class). The tuition free program is a school-within-a-school for highly gifted students who will be in grades 2-9. Siblings of students in the elementary Quest program may choose to open-enroll as well.

Students must make a request to be assessed for the Quest program. Students who are considered for placement should score in the mid 90th percentiles on the MAP and CogAT tests. In addition, parents and teachers submit information on students to help guide the team in making placement decisions for the program.

The curriculum in the Quest program is accelerated in mathematics and science, with students studying content above grade level. It is also highly enriched in language arts and social studies. Instructors in the Quest program receive specialized training for meeting the needs of highly gifted students. Students can expect to learn at a faster pace than in a regular classroom, and to apply what is being learned to the world through technology and connections in the community. Students have the opportunity to produce work at an advanced level, and will receive homework appropriate for their learning needs. Qualified resident students receive priority placement. All qualified students participate tuition free.

Musical Greetings to you!

In January, music students will be digging into a new music program we are piloting called Quaver. This is an exciting program to help kids learn about music. Primary grades (K, 1, 2) will be working on identifying solfege pitches by sight and sound, exploring pentatonic scales and steps, skips and repeated pitches and identifying high and low pitch in the music. Intermediate grades (3, 4, 5) will be reviewing note names of the treble clef and rhythm counting to prepare for their recorder unit. We will play recorders for approximately 6 weeks (which is about 6-7 music sessions). The recorder unit will culminate with a performance assessment for each student. We will also continue our Recorder Karate. I am sure you will hear a lot of practicing at home so students can earn those coveted Recorder Karate belts! **Recorder orders are due no later than Friday, January 11th!**



Our NES 4th and 5th Grade Choir will begin Thursday, January 31st. You child may sign up either through Community Education, or using the letter sent home this week. Our choir will rehearse every Thursday through April 25th. We will have our final concert on Tuesday, April 30th at both 1:30pm (for the school) and 6:30pm (for parents and relatives). I hope to see many singers in choir this spring!

Social Emotional Focus— Ms. Hageman


Our goal at Northwinds is to focus on the development of the whole child. This means we focus not only on academic learning, but social and emotional learning. Research has continuously shown that children who have strong social skills and emotional skills also tend to perform better academically. The Collaboration for Academic, Social, and Emotional Learning (CASEL) defines Social and Emotional Learning as "the process through which children and adults acquire and effectively apply the knowledge, attitudes, and skills necessary to understand and manage emotions, set and achieve positive goals, feel and show empathy for others, establish and maintain positive relationships, and make responsible decisions". Simply put, our social and emotional skills helps us to be successful in our careers, manage our emotions well, and maintain positive relationships with others.

CASEL breaks Social and Emotional Skills into 5 different skill set categories. These skills sets are as follows:

- 1. Self-Awareness The ability to identify one's thoughts, feelings, and strengths, and recognize how they influence one's choices and actions.
- 2. Social-Awareness The ability to identify and understand the thoughts and feelings of others, respect their rights, and appreciate diversity.
- 3. Self-Management The ability to establish and work toward short- and long-term goals, and handle emotions so that they facilitate rather than interfere with the task at hand.
- 4. Responsible Decision Making The ability to generate, implement, and evaluate positive and informed solutions to problems, and assume responsibility for personal decisions and behaviors.
- 5. Relationship Skills The ability to establish and maintain healthy and rewarding connections with individuals and groups through communication, listening, and negotiation skills.

Schools do help children develop these 5 different skill areas in a variety of ways. However, parents often have much more impact on student's social and emotional learning. Parents are one of the first people in a student's life who can help a student learn social and emotional skills. Therefore, Northwinds and parents can partner together to help children develop these skill areas. This column will focus on strategies for parents/guardians on how to develop these 5 different skill areas for the remainder of the year.
