### Mr. Mischke's Message

What an amazing "Day One" of school! For the first time in BHM history, our school year started with only the freshman class. Our teaching staff, along with our BHS student mentors welcomed almost 500 new students to Buffalo High School. Our goal on day one was to make sure our freshmen's first day of High School was a positive one. Two of our building goals at Buffalo High School are to ensure that 100% of our students have an adult to whom they can go if they have a problem (currently 91%), and that 100% of our students feel supported by other students (currently 82%). When looking at the data from our annual student survey, we've consistently noticed a drastic difference as we compared 9th grade results to our other grade levels. Freshmen were less connected to our staff and to each other. We are confident that this new staggered first day of school change will help to bridge the gap in our results this spring and in the years to come. Thank you for your flexibility and support in making this day happen.

Our fall Parent/Teacher Conferences will be held on Monday, October 8 from 5-8 p.m in the BHS cafeteria. October is College Knowledge Month at BHS and in addition to our conferences, we will be hosting our very first BHM College and Career Fair with over 40 businesses, college and military branch representatives in attendance. This event will take place during our parent/teacher conferences from 5-7 p.m. in the main gym and is intended for our current students and their families. The College and Career Fair is only one way in which BHS is getting involved in the College Knowledge Month activities.

The importance of building relational capacity is not only a focus at Buffalo High School, but it is the driving force for the entire Buffalo-Hanover-Montrose school district. We as a district are committed to taking the steps needed to ensure that every student has an opportunity to develop the skills they need to be successful now and in the future. We know that smaller class sizes, a more comprehensive middle school schedule and well-trained teaching staff will help us reach the goal of "every kid every day." Therefore, on November 6, 2018 the BHM School district is asking voters to approve an operating referendum. You'll find more details within this newsletter.

Recently, I had the opportunity to represent Buffalo High School and Minnesota in Washington D.C. at the National Secondary Principal of the Year Conference. It was a tremendous opportunity to learn from others and share some of the great things happening at Buffalo High School. We are extremely fortunate to have amazing students and staff, and tremendously supportive communities in Buffalo, Hanover, and Montrose.

As a parent, community member and educator I am so proud of the work we are able to do everyday, and I am honored to have the opportunity to continue to serve as the Principal at BHS.

#### <u>Transcripts</u>

All official high school transcripts must be sent using an online transcript ordering service at www.parchment.com. Stu dents create a profile and request to send official transcripts to any of the college or scholarship organizations needed.

#### <u>Freshman Minute Meetings</u>

Counselors will be meeting with all Freshman students individually through "Minute Meetings" during their Bison Times over the course of late September-December. The purpose of the meetings are to give the counselors an opportunity to meet their freshmen and learn a little bit about how they can support each of their students. The students get the chance to meet their individual counselor to start making connections and learn about how to access the many resources that school counselors provide throughout high school.

#### Junior Large Group Meetings

Junior students will be invited to a large group meeting during AAA the first week of October. The presentations are given to students by their counselor. Students will be provided information and resources for them to continue their post high school planning. An overview of topics include prep information for college admissions tests (ACT/SAT/Accuplacer), information about meeting colleges reps here at BHS, planning college tours, going to college fairs, reminder of credits needed for graduation, using MCIS to help them search and plan for their futures, NCAA information, and information about College Knowledge Month. Students will also have an opportunity to take resources with them from the meeting to help them continue their searches and plans for after graduation.

#### PSAT: Wed., October 10

The PSAT/NMSQT (Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test) will be given at Buffalo High School on October 10th at **7:45AM** in the Bison Room. The PSAT is an opportunity for students to practice taking a rigorous college entrance exam, and for students in 11th grade to compete to qualify for the very distinguished National Merit Scholarship. There are a limited number of tests. Students can check in the Student Services office and pay the \$20 fee.

#### Pre-ACT

Students in 10th grade will complete the Pre-ACT assessment on November 19th and 20th. The Pre-ACT, formerly the ACT Plan test, assesses students on the following subjects: English, mathematics, reading, and science. The Pre-ACT helps 10th grade students build a solid foundation for future academic and career success and provides a comprehensive guidance resource that helps students measure their current academic development, explore career/ training options, and make plans for the remaining years of high school and post-graduation years. The Pre-ACT also provides a predictive ACT composite score. If results are back in time, they will be shared prior to registration in order to support decision making for class selection.

#### **College Knowledge Month**

• BHS will be hosting Mini College Fairs on Tuesdays during lunches every week in October. There will be 7-9 reps each week in the areas of U of M System, MNState 4yr System, 2yr college, Trade School, Out of State, Private Colleges, and Military.

• BHS will also have several college admissions reps, speakers, and individual help taking place during AAA throughout the month of October. Students have the opportunity to learn more about NCAA eligibility, how to fill out a college application, military officer training programs, financial aid, college essay help, study abroad, and more!

• During the week of October

22nd-26th, senior students have the opportunity to get help completing their college applications from 3:05-4pm in lab B203. Many MN colleges waive their application fees during this week.

Students should check out the posters, watch the monitor announcements, and their email for events scheduled throughout the month.

Free and open to the public, National College Fairs are the perfect place to kick off your college search. Admission representatives from schools across the country are all gathered in one place. Their goal: To encourage you to learn more about their institutions, and help you sort through the qualities you're looking for in a college. Explore your options. #### Waivers for Students on Free or Reduced Lunch

Waivers are available for students on free or reduced lunch that can cover the cost of some college applications, ACT/PSAT testing, and official transcripts. Please provide your student's counselor with a copy of your notification letter from Food Service to receive any waivers that are available.

#### **FAFSA Completion Workshop**

Do you need help completing your Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA)? On Monday, **October 8, from 5-8p.m. in BHS computer lab B203**, we will have financial aid professionals on hand to help families submit their FAFSA. No reservation needed. What to bring:

• Social security number, date of birth for both STUDENT and PARENT

• Federal Student Aid (FSA) ID – they can apply for this up to five (5) days prior to the event at <u>https://fsaid.ed.gov/</u><u>npas/index.htm</u> or apply that evening. **NOTE:** They must have confirmed their FSA ID with a 6-digit code at the time they apply for it in order for it to be valid to sign the FAFSA

• 2017 federal income tax information for both STUDENT and PARENT

• **2017 W-2 statements** for both STUDENT and PARENT

• Balances of cash, checking, savings accounts as of the day they file their FAFSA. NOTE: Do not include values of retirement plans or equity of the home in which they live

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BHM Operating Referendum Vote: November 6, 2018

Just the Facts

The place to dream, believe and achieve.

#### The Question

The BHM School Board has proposed to revoke the school district's existing referendum revenue authorization of \$119.87 per pupil and replace that authorization with a new authorization of \$1,067.87 per pupil. The net difference is \$950 per pupil. Beginning with taxes payable in 2019, the new net authorization would increase each year by the rate of inflation for over a 10-year period.

### Why Now?

- The district can no longer spend down the district's fund balance to maintain class sizes.
- Addressing school safety and security issues and providing more mental health support is a top priority.
- Expanding opportunities for middle school students to receive extra help and have more elective class choices is very important.
- The state is not fully funding special education programs forcing our district to fill the \$760 per pupil funding gap.

# Financial Q <sup>®</sup> A

The place to dream, believe and achieve.

If you need to fill the \$760 special education funding gap and you are asking for \$1,067.87 (net \$950) for this operating referendum, doesn't that mean 71% of this money will go towards special education?

**No.** The state and federal government continue to underfund the special education mandates they have placed on school districts. BHM Schools is already spending money for special education from our general fund to cover the cost. The funds raised through this referendum will free-up those funds to be spent in areas that benefit all students such as **reducing class sizes**, **expanding middle school opportunities**, **addressing school safety and security through personnel and infrastructure**, and **addressing the budget deficit**. Specific amounts have not been determined for each of these four areas because it could fluctuate from year to year–especially with class sizes.

#### Why the big jump from \$119.87 to \$950?

**The last voter approved operating referendum was 16 years ago.** The district asked for an increase in operating funds in 2007 and 2008 and was unsuccessful, resulting in two years of budget reductions and a loss of 40 teachers. Since then, the district has used one-time state and federal funds and has begun to spend down the fund balance. The school board has been committed to class size reductions and over the last several years has hired back 18 teachers. With the lack of school funding, we can not sustain what we have, make additional investments in educational programming, improve student safety with personnel or make further reductions in class sizes. Even with the additional funding request of \$950, we are still below the state average for general education revenue.

We just gave you money in the 2014 bond referendum election to help with safety and security. Do you need additional funds to do more or did you not budget those projects adequately?

**Yes we budgeted adequately, but we need to do more.** The funds from the 2014 bond referendum could ONLY be used for building projects and upgrades. We improved the safety and security of our buildings by building new, secure entrances at Discovery Elementary, Hanover Elementary and Tatanka Elementary STEM School. We also added video cameras, updated intercom systems, fixed roofs, repaired parking lots and sidewalks, and upgraded the phone system (along with many other improvements).

Since 2014, many factors have changed in the way we want to protect our students in our schools and other safety measures we want to put in place. This referendum will address the need to reduce class sizes and hire personnel to deal with student mental health issues and provide funds for school improvements such as bullet resistant window film, a blue light alert system (notifies students when they can't hear announcements), open door indicators and other identified safety improvements.

#### Can you use the 2014 bond referendum funding to help pay for more teachers?

**No.** The funds from the 2014 bond referendum could ONLY be used for the building projects and upgrades as identified and could not be used for operating expenses such as teacher salaries. Funds from the 2014 bond election can only be placed in Fund 06 (Construction Fund) which can only pay for construction related costs. Teachers are not an allowable expenditure in the Construction Fund.

#### If this operating referendum passes, how much will my taxes go up each year?

**See the tax impact chart on the front page.** If this operating referendum passes, it will be in effect for the next 10 years. As you will see on the tax impact chart, the estimated tax on a \$250,000 home would be \$436 for the year or \$36.33 per month. This amount will fluctuate each year based on the rate of inflation. If inflation goes up by 1%, that amount will increase \$4.36 to \$440.36 or \$36.69 per month.
