# Mr. Mischke's Message

To our BHS community: thank you! You have helped deliver a very successful start to the 2019-20 school year.

BUFFALO HIGH SCHOOL

Our annual "Day One" for our incoming freshmen was a great way to begin the school year, and our transition into our new schedule has gone well. As we continue to take the next steps in becoming the best high school in the state of Minnesota, we realize that we need to constantly evaluate the most effective way to accomplish this goal. We see two main indicators as the cornerstone to this work. We want 100% of our students to have an adult they can go to if they have a problem, and we want 100% of our students to feel supported by other students at BHS. Over the last five years, our spring student survey results have consistently been approximately 90% and 80% respectively. We knew we needed to become more intentional to get to 100% with our goals. We've created structures in our schedule to bring a systematic approach to relationship building and academic support. Every student in our building now has an Advisory that allows them to have a consistent support team during their four years at BHS. We also have created BASE (Bison Academic Support and Enrichment) time that assures every student can get the academic support they need within the school day, twice per week. We will continue to share updates on the progress we are making with the new systems throughout the school year.

This fall is an extremely important time in terms of the long term stability of Buffalo High School and our school district. In November of 2018, the BHM school district asked voters to pass a levy that would have provided further funds to operate the district. It did not pass. As a result, the district made \$1.3 million in reductions for the 2019-2020 school year with another \$2.9 million in cuts planned for 2020-2021. Many people are asking why the district is in this situation. There are three main reasons: The consistent shortfall in state funding on an annual basis, the lack of a local levy in place to help offset the need to spend down our reserves to cover the gap in funding, and the increase in costs associated with providing educational opportunities for all students. I would strongly encourage you to read the BHM Insider. It does a great job of explaining where we are at as a school district going into the November vote.

At Buffalo High School, we have already felt the impact in a variety of ways, most importantly through the reduction of 3.33 teachers; this resulted in the elimination of 40 sections of class options for a student body of 1900+ students. The proposed cuts for 2020-21 would require us to eliminate approximately five additional teachers (60 classes) from BHS while our student population continues to stay steady. Simply put, course options will again be eliminated, and class sizes will grow even more. In addition, we would completely eliminate our Phoenix Learning Center, our district's only alternative program for BHS students, and the wRight Choice program.

Throughout the month of October, there will be multiple opportunities to find out more about the upcoming levy and the impact it will have on the long term future of our school district. There will be informational meetings on October 1st at the BHM District office, October 3rd at Montrose Elementary, October 7th at Buffalo High School and October 10th at Hanover Elementary. All of these meetings will start at 7:00 pm. I would strongly encourage our families and community members attend one of these meetings to become well informed in regards to the impact the November 5th levy vote will have on our school district. I know that there are many factors to consider when asking the community to contribute more dollars for our schools. Yet, it is important to understand the impact of those dollars on education.

Our fall Parent/Teacher Conferences will be held on Monday, October 7th from 5:00-8:00 p.m. in the BHS cafeteria. October is known as College Knowledge month. At BHS, our counselors and MnTC Coordinator have been planning a variety of activities highlighting different options available to our students after they complete high school. To help kick-off College Knowledge month, we will be hosting our 2nd annual BHM College and Career Fair at which over 60 businesses, college and military branch representatives will be in attendance! This event will take place during our parent/teacher conferences from 5:30 - 7:30 p.m. in the main gym and is intended for our current students and their families.

As a parent, community member, and educator I am so proud of the work we are able to do everyday, and I am honored to have the opportunity to continue to serve as the Principal at BHS.

We hope to see you on October 7th.

# **Counselor's Corner**

### Freshmen

# Juniors

Applicable junior information will be provided to all juniors during advisory time this fall. Students will be provided information and resources for them to continue their post high school planning. Topics include prep information for college admissions tests (ACT/SAT/Accuplacer), information about meeting colleges reps here at BHS, planning college tours, going to college fairs, reminder of credits needed for graduation, using MCIS to help them search and plan for their futures, NCAA information, and information about College Knowledge Month. Students that want additional information or help, will also have an opportunity to take resources with them from the meeting to help them continue their searches and plans for after graduation. # PSAT – Wednesday, October Uctor 16th, 2019

The PSAT/NMSOT (Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test) will be given at Buffalo High School on October 16th at 7:45AM in the Bison Room. The test will conclude around 11:30am. \*This is a nonschool day. Students are responsible for their own transportation.\* The PSAT is an opportunity for students to practice taking a rigorous college entrance exam, and for students in 11th grade to compete to qualify for the very distinguished National Merit Scholarship. There are a limited number of tests. Families can sign up for the PSAT through FeePay, the cost is \$20. Students on free/ reduced lunch will be free or \$10 and must also sign up through FeePay.

# **Pre-ACT**

Students in 10th grade will complete the Pre-ACT assessment on November 19th and 20th. The Pre-ACT, formerly the ACT Plan test, assesses students on the following subjects: English, mathematics, reading, and science. The Pre-ACT helps 10th grade students build a solid foundation for future academic and career success and provides a comprehensive guidance resource that helps students measure their current academic development, explore career/training options, and make plans for the remaining years of high school and post-graduation years. The Pre-ACT also provides a predictive ACT composite score. If results are back in time, they will be shared prior to registration in

order to support decision making for future class selection.

# October is College Knowledge Month

BHS will be hosting Mini College Fairs on Tuesdays during lunches every week in October. There will be seven to nine reps each week from the U of M System, MNState 4yr System, 2yr college, Trade School, Out of State, Private Colleges, and Military. Throughout the month of October, students will have the option to sign up for several different sessions being offered through BASE time. Students have the opportunity to learn more about NCAA eligibility, how to fill out a college application, financial aid, how to send transcripts, how to prepare for college visits and questions to ask admissions reps, and more! During the week of October 21st-25th, senior students have the opportunity to get help completing their college applications during their lunch and BASE time. Many Minnesota colleges waive their application fees during the month of October. Students should check out the posters, watch the monitor announcements, check in with their advisors, and their check their email for events scheduled throughout the month.

# University of Minnesota START Study: Teenagers, Sleep & School Start

Buffalo High School was one of five Minnesota high schools that participated in the University of Minnesota's START Study. The goal of the START study was to examine the impact of later school start times on sleep on health-related behaviors among teenagers. Data was collected in two ways. First, all participants were invited to complete a survey and have their height and weight measured. A subgroup of students were randomly selected to wear a sensor on their wrist (like a Fitbit) that measured their rest/activity cycles and completed an in-depth dietary questionnaire. Data was collected each Spring from in 2016-2018 with the class of 2019 in five area high schools.

The National Sleep Foundation recommends that 14-17-year-olds get 8-10 hours of sleep per night. However, the vast majority of US teenagers sleep less than this on a typical school night. Neurobiological changes, occurring during

Lake Conference Reflections

Greetings! I hope your school year is off to a great start. As we approach October, six of our Bison sports programs will be closing up Fall seasons for the first time as members of the <u>Lake Conference</u>. From the desk of the BHS Activities Director, I continue to feel a great sense of pride about the purple and white, our athletes, and our programs.

As anticipated, BHS athletics programs are now navigating what might be the most competitive conference schedules in the school's history competing against powerhouse schools with much larger enrollments. Our coaches have worked hard framing these competitive experiences for our athletes. The "buy in" and positive outlook I have seen from our athletes puberty, can cause teenagers' sleepwake cycle to shift roughly two hours later making it difficult for them to fall asleep before 11pm or wake-up before 8am. For this reason, early school start times, can be a barrier to adolescents getting a healthy amount of sleep.



Without sufficient sleep, there can be both immediate and long-term consequences for teens' health and well-being including an increased risk for injury, depression, diabetes and cardiovascular disease.<sup>1</sup>

Data from the study shows that teenagers who attended schools that shifted to a later school start time got about a half hour more sleep per weekday night relative to teenagers that attended schools that kept their start times early.

has been impressive and rewarding to see. Appropriate and realistic goals are being set, morale remains high, teammates are picking each other up when needed, and kids are still having fun. Bison athletes are continuing to develop and get better each day.

And now as our Varsity level programs move into section play, Bison teams can be realizing the advantage of knowing they have competed against some of the state's best individuals and teams. The level of confidence Bison athletes have gained competing regularly against these schools has yet to be realized. Our staff will continue to remind Bison athletes that "no stage is too Teenagers with a later school start time need 44 minutes less catch up sleep on weekends than early start teenagers. Needing more catch up sleep on weekends is an indicator of not getting enough sleep during the week.

Data from 2016 also shows longer sleep duration is associated with lower odds of indicators of depression risk.

# 2019 BHM Operating Referendum

BHM School District residents will vote on an operating referendum to **maintain the high-quality programs and services** BHM Schools already offers. The district is asking for \$750 per student (this is **NOT** each property owner's tax impact-see chart) and would be in place for the next five years. This operating referendum will **NOT** restore any of the budget cuts made for the 2019-20 school year and will **NOT** add anything new.

If approved, this referendum would prevent the following budget reductions (totalling \$2.9 million) for the 2020-21 school year. Some of the reductions include:

- Cut 22 teachers, 1 administration and 11 other staff
- Close Phoenix Learning Center
- Close Discovery Elementary
- Cut Quest (gifted program)
- Cut the wRight Choice program (alternative to out-of-school suspension)
- Cut 6 activities at Buffalo High School
- Cut ALL middle school activities
- Cut 3 regular bus routes (longer ride times and longer walking distances)

Many owners of homestead property will qualify for a refund, based on their income and total property taxes. This will decrease the net effect of the referendum levy for many property owners.

NOTE: Agriculture property will pay taxes for the proposed referendum based only on the value of the house, garage and one acre. Seasonal recreational residential property (i.e. cabina) will pay no taxes for the proposed referendum.
