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From the Principal's Desk...

It's crazy to think that we have less than 30 school days left in our year! It's been an amazing year and we are so proud of all of the great things our students at Hanover Elementary have accomplished so far. At our April Recognition Program, we recognized many of our students' accomplishments and talked about finishing our school year strong. Just like a race, we want to make sure that we can cross that finish line. That means continuing to be the hard workers and positive leaders that we know they all are!

I also want to take a minute to thank all of our volunteers that have helped throughout the year. One of the many things that makes Hanover Elementary great is the amount of volunteers we have on a regular basis. We are truly blessed to have so many people willing and able to give their time and support to help our students learn at high levels. Thank you again to all of our volunteers for making this a great place for our kids!

Lastly, this past month I communicated with our 1st grade parents in regards to section reductions that are taking place for their students for next school year. Unfortunately, because of district budget reductions, we have to reduce our four sections of first grade down to three sections for 2nd grade in the 2019-20 school year. Our district budget reductions are due to the referendum failing this past fall as well as the continued lack of adequate funding from the Federal and State Governments to school districts. Our school board has been able to maintain our smaller class sizes over the past handful of years by intentionally spending down our district reserve. Unfortunately, they will not be able to sustain this anymore until our funding inequities are addressed. In the meantime, that means budget reductions across the district. Hanover Elementary is not the only school being impacted as many other schools are seeing a reduction in staff as well. Our staffing allocation for the 2019-20 school year will have 3 sections in each grade level. Though next year's 2nd grade class is the one being most impacted here at HES by higher class sizes, I wanted to make sure I communicated this to all our Hanover parents so you were aware of why these reductions were taking place.

How can you help? The best thing you can do is to talk to your friends and neighbors about these reductions and funding inequities that our district is facing, so they are aware. You can also contact your state and federal legislators. If you want more information, you can also contact school board members, our superintendent of schools or the district's finance and operations director. As always, if you have questions or concerns, you can reach out to me as well.

This last month of school will go by quickly and we have many fun events to help finish off the year on a great note. Thanks again for all of your support and I hope to see you at the All School Picnic on May 30th!



Remember the 85-15 rule when it comes to discipline

Too often, discipline gets a bad rap. Many parents think it means punishing their children when they misbehave, which isn't very enjoyable for children or parents.

However, the word discipline actually comes from the Latin word disciplina, which means "teaching." So try thinking about discipline in a different way. Think of discipline as a way to teach your child the skills she needs to succeed in life.

Most of your discipline—roughly 85 percent—should focus on encouraging the behavior you want to see in your child. You can do this by being a good role model. For example, if you want your child to be kind, be kind to others. If you want her to be responsible, keep your own commitments.

You can also point out others who display the behaviors you'd like to encourage. And when you see your child doing the right thing, notice and compliment her.

That leaves just 15 percent of the time to focus on correcting her negative behavior. While you will still have to set rules and enforce consequences, you'll get to spend most of your time focusing on the positive.

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Four ways to motivate your child to read over the summer

Studies show that when kids don't keep up with reading over the summer, they can lose up to three months of learning—and feel the effects for a long time! Fortunately, this doesn't have to happen.

To encourage summer reading:

- 1. Join a reading program. Ask the librarian at your local library for a list of programs your child can attend.
- 2. Be creative. Remember that all kinds of reading materials can help your child build and maintain skills—craft magazines, comic books and even cookbooks.
- 3. Focus on your child's interests. Ask him if there is something he would like to learn more about during the school break? Maybe he wants to identify stars and constellations at night or learn how to camp. Help him find books about subjects he loves.
- 4. Plan a book swap. Have your child invite friends to participate in a book exchange event. If a child donates two books he has read, he can exchange them for two books he hasn't read.

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Help your child reflect on the year and celebrate success

As the school year winds down, it's a great time to help your child look back, look forward, give thanks and celebrate. Here's how:

- Talk to your child's teacher. Ask about your child's strengths and weaknesses. How has she improved? Where does she need more work? Ask what you can do to help your child over the summer.
- Talk to your child about the school year. Ask what she thinks went well. Talk about what challenged her most. Help her figure out what changes she should make for the upcoming school year.
- Review your child's successes. Look over schoolwork you've saved during the year. Z Point out how much your child has learned—how many new words, for example. Or how she can add and divide. Or how her writing has improved.
- Help your child set learning goals for the summer. Should she spend more time reading? Should she practice math concepts? Guide her, based on the suggestions from her teacher.
- Encourage your child to thank those who have made the year a good one—the teacher, bus driver, librarian, food service worker, etc. This will help her appreciate how many people have helped her.
- Celebrate with a special activity. It doesn't have to be elaborate or cost anything. Just make plans to enjoy some one-on-one time with your child.
