## Your Vote Matters

In less than two weeks, the Matters family and BHM School District residents have an important decision to make. It has been 17 years since the last voter-approved operating levy for the school district. Last fall, residents voted down an operating levy proposal and as a result, the district cut just over \$1.3 million from the budget for the 2019-20 school year.

The district's need for operating funds has not gone away. Funding has not kept pace with the rate of inflation and the state and federal governments are not fully funding the special education mandates that are in place for public schools.

**If the operating levy IS approved** it will generate \$750 per student for the next five years (this is NOT the tax impact for each tax payer), and the district will continue to operate as normal. The district will not have to make any additional cuts. Cuts for the 2019-20 school year will NOT be restored.

**If the operating levy is NOT approved** the district will need to make \$2.9 million in budget reductions for next school year, 2020-21. Some of the reductions will include:

- Cut 22 teachers, 1 administration and 11 other staff members
- Close Phoenix Learning Center
- Close Discovery Elementary
- Cut Quest (gifted program)
- Cut wRight Choice (alternative for out-of-school suspension)

- Cut 6 activities at Buffalo High School
- Cut ALL middle school activities
- Cut 3 regular bus routes (longer ride times and longer walking distances)
- Increase Buffalo High School activity and parking fees
- Increase Buffalo High School activity passes, tickets and gate prices
- Reduce College in the Schools offerings
- Reduce supply budgets district-wide by 11%

BHM school district is proud of the relationships our teachers and staff have with our students, the academic choices we provide to students, and the number of opportunities and options students and parents are offered. Every day our teachers, support staff and principals make decisions and provide

opportunities for students based on their students' best interests. Those decisions have given our students the opportunity to excel each and every day. It can be witnessed in our schools when we see students receive individualized instruction and attention. It is evident in the opportunities and choices students are afforded to choose college credit bearing courses for technical colleges, two-year colleges or four-year colleges. As stated above, every decision that is made in the BHM School District is made in the best interests of our students. The district wants to keep all of its schools open and continue to provide all of its outstanding programs and opportunities for our students. It is my hope that our community has seen and read about the upcoming operating levy and the needs of the district as it made bud-

get reductions for the 2019-20 school year (\$1.375 million) and the drastic budget cuts it faces for the 20-21 school year (\$2.9 million) and beyond.

These budget cuts are not unique to BHM Schools and unfortunately, the reality is, BHM is one of the few school districts that do not have an operating levy in place. In fact, the BHM School District hasn't had an increase in the voter-approved operating levy since 2002. The proposed operating levy will provide additional revenue for the school district for the next five years. The revenue will allow the district to keep all of the current teachers and programs for our students but will not add anything new for our students. We encourage everyone to be informed about the upcoming levy and to vote on November 5.

# School Start Time Study

## Sleep Results are In

This is the fourth year students at the secondary level are starting school later than before. Originally, secondary students began school at 7:45 a.m. Now, students begin class at 8:50 a.m., about an hour later. This places the district in alignment with the American Academy of Pediatrics recommendation to delay the start of middle and high school times to 8:30 p.m. or later.

The year before the district made the time switch, Buffalo High School (BHS) was asked to participate in a multi-year START Study conducted by the University of Minnesota and led by U of M professor and Social Epidemiologist, Dr. Rachel Widome. So far, over the course of the last three years, the study has shown that students are now getting an average of about 34 minutes more sleep per night than other students in the study who did not change to a later start time. It was also shown that BHS students are sleeping less over the weekend indicating the need for less "catch-up sleep."

It was also revealed that fewer students were identifying themselves as victims to bullying, after the time change as compared to



before the change. This can't be directly aligned with the later start time, but the shift is moving in a positive direction. Another point of interest is the drop in the number of Buffalo Hospital Emergency Room visits by teens in the communities of Buffalo, Hanover and Montrose. Buffalo physician, Dr. Cory Martin has reported a 40% drop in BHM teen visits in the ER from 2015-2018. Again, it's uncertain if these teens attend school in BHM Schools, but the shift is positive.

BHS has noted an improvement in the number of students tardy for their first class of the day. Overall, since 2015-16, that number

has dropped by more than 20%. BHS has also noted that the time change has not had a negative impact on students' grades or in the number of students participating in sports and activities (no significant decrease). Some students and parents have felt that the later start time posed as a barrier for employment opportunities. BHS responded to this concern with a creative solution to create, develop and expand the Work Experience and On-the-Job Training provided to students.

Dr. Widome said there is one more year left of the study to analyze the data collected. More information will be shared as it's discovered.

## Leading the Band, Buffalo Royalty and the School District

You only need to know the name, Anita. Her name is as interesting and unique as she is. Born to Les and Marilyn Dalman in Maple Lake, Minnesota, it wasn't long before they moved their family to Buffalo in 1962. Anita was in the first grade and attended St. Francis Xavier through 6th grade. Being the oldest of three girls, it was her natural ability to be responsible, organized and a strong leader.

Anita attended 7th and 8th grade in the building now known as Discovery Center. She was in the first freshman class to attend the new high school, in 1971, now known as Buffalo Community Middle School. Sports were not readily available to female students at that time, but she made sure she tried a variety of activities including German club, choir, yearbook and was captain of the color guard for marching band. She remembers enjoying her math, accounting, typing and shorthand classes with Mr. Melby and Mr. Specht. She loved working with numbers and she mentioned that those were two good teachers and they made going to class fun.

After graduating from Buffalo High School (BHS) in 1974, Anita set her sights on the big city of Minneapolis and began working immediately as the secretary for the small

group insurance department at IDS Life Insurance in the IDS Tower. It wasn't long before she became re-acquainted with 1972 BHS graduate Kevin Underberg, and she was back in Buffalo. They married in 1977 and had their first daughter, Jackie, in 1978. Just a short 17 months later, their second daughter April was born. Anita was able to be home with the girls until they both were in school, and she followed right behind them, landing a job in Community Education. What started out as a summer job-share position in 1986 soon turned to a full-time secretary to the director of community education.

By 1991, Anita became the BHM Administrative Assistant to the Superintendent and the Board of Education. For the last 28 years she has been the quiet leader behind the scenes managing the superintendent's schedule and budget, generating teacher contracts, setting the school year calendar, monitoring and reporting on enrollment numbers, maintaining district policies and emergency procedures, and proofing all district level communications. She also serves the school board by setting their agendas and taking minutes at all workshops and meetings. She is responsible for school board and referendum elections by coordinating polling places, judges, election equipment and organizing all of the legal forms and procedures. One of her most rewarding tasks she coordinates is the district retirement luncheon. "It is a great opportunity for our staff to be recognized by the superintendent and school board for their years of service to our students. It's really a special event."

Giving back to the community has been an important part of Anita's life. She has volunteered

in many different capacities for her church and various service organizations. Possibly one of her biggest contributions is during Buffalo Days. "My experience in BHM Schools taught me to put forth my best effort in everything I do. I realized during high school that I liked to be involved in a variety of things. My job provides me with that. I didn't go onto to college after high school, but it was a different time back then. I was on the cusp of women staying home and raising a family and women entering the workplace. In those days, you didn't necessarily need to go onto school. But today we know a college or technical school degree is necessary to find a good job. I hope every student today can find their calling in a career that gives them fulfillment like I did."

Anita has always been involved with her daughters as they navigated through BHM Schools, from volleyball boosters to president of the Herd Band Aids. Both are now living and raising their families in the district also. With six grandchildren being raised in BHM Schools, Anita is excited for the opportunities that will be afforded to them. "So much has changed since I was in BHM Schools and yet the hope for everyone to be successful has remained constant."

## New Schedule for Buffalo High School

Students at Buffalo High School (BHS) started the 2019-20 school year with a new daily schedule. The new schedule shifted the end of the day AAA/Bison Time and repurposed it into the middle of the day in two ways: Advisory Time and structured Bison Academic Support and Enrichment (BASE) Time.

Advisory Time focuses on making sure every student at BHS has a staff member with whom they can connect, as well as experience personal and academic growth. Lessons focus on college/career readiness, academic support and planning, and social/emotional literacy. Students start the week with this group (on Mondays) and check-out at the end of the week together on Fridays. Students are in an Advisory Group, with roughly 18-20 students per staff member, for 30 minutes. They are arranged in groups by grade and their assigned counselor and will stay in the same group for their entire

time at BHS. The goal is to produce stronger connections between students and staff and provide an experience of belonging, foster healthy relationships, develop academic skills, and enhance school culture.

The structured BASE Time involves identifying and supporting, in a timely yet flexible fashion, students who are in need of additional support with their classes, as well as those in need of enrichment. ALL students get 35 minutes of scheduled time on Tuesdays and Thursdays to see teachers for extra homework help or enrichment. This approach promotes equity, rapport-building, and accountability for everyone.

Change is always challenging. Students have mixed feelings about the shift, but have positive feelings about it for the most part. Seniors Chloe Lohse and Maggie Hermanson both have appreciated BASE Time to work on homework and get extra help if it's needed.
